Important Bird & Biodiversity Areas - Criteria:

- Threatened Species sites that hold endangered or threatened birds.
- Birds with restricted breeding ranges

 endemic species: more applicable in tropical countries.
- Biome-restricted assemblages or unique natural community type: often sites of general conservation interest.
- Bird Concentrations significant numbers when breeding, wintering, migrating. The majority of Canada's sites are in this category.

IBA Program in British Columbia

BC Nature (Federation of BC Naturalists) coordinates the program with the support of national partners Nature Canada & Bird Studies Canada. We are enlisting the support of other birding, naturalist, conservation groups, and agencies.

The primary goals of the BC Program are to support the BC IBA Caretaker Network, monitor sites, and public education.

What IBAs are NOT!

- Important Bird & Biodiversity Areas are not all the areas important for birds in the province, country or world.
- They are only the sites which meet the specific, scientific criteria.
- Many other sites have important bird populations.
- Diffuse songbird habitats are rather poorly represented in the IBA Program.



The IBA Program

The Important Bird & Biodiversity Areas program is an international effort to identify, conserve and monitor a network of sites that provide essential habitat for bird populations. BirdLife International began the IBA program in the 1980s, and since that time partners in some 200 countries have joined together to build the global IBA network.

Since 1996, ~600 IBAs have been identified and designated in Canada, with over 80 of them in British Columbia, Because 89% of Canada's birds migrate beyond our borders, an international program is essential to conserve birds throughout their range. British Columbia is a vital link in the chain: our network of IBAs provide essential habitat for nesting, wintering and migrating birds.

Goals of the **IBA Program**

- Identification of bird sites
- Designation of IBAs based on criteria and recognition by communities
- Protection of IBAs through support of local community, individuals, groups and governments.

 Monitoring of IBAs to identify and address bird population trends and threats to bird conservation.
